
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# The African Presence In Santo Domingo (Ruth Simms Hamilton African Diaspora)

This book is a great start for beginners. However, it is only about 77 pages in length; thus, not exhaustive. This book does, however, challenge hegemonic notions of Dominicanness or dominicanidad. It was awesome coming across the list of names of the various African ethnic groups ("tribes") that came to the shores of Santo Domingo. Actually an essay and finally translated by the author's sisters into English, this book is simply nice having in one's library, simply so that curious folk and visitors can have a quick read of it.Peace & Blessings.

False advertising. This is not a book but an essay. And a weak one at that. Fully one-third of this

short work is mere padding. The history of pre-colonial Africa and "triangle trade" is superficial and generalized. Wikipedia can do better. The thesis--African culture in the Santo Domingo diaspora--is barely touched upon, in random bits. For example, on the influence of West African language on Dominican Spanish, the deletion of final consonants in speech is noted. That's all. The essay is mostly irrelevant padding. Insights and explanations are few and far between. NOT RECOMMENDED.

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
