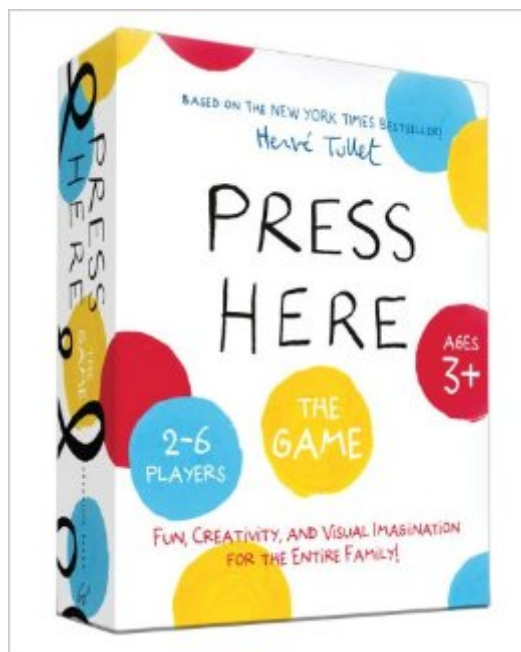


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# Press Here Game

Brilliant game. This is going to be a new classic. Truly a game for all ages; no artistic ability needed but an intuitive visual logic is engaged when you play. Played with my husband today and can't wait to play with my kids at school; I am a K-5th art teacher and thinking of buying a few boxes so we could have "Press Here" art party. Herve Tullet is refreshingly brilliant.

We love this book, but the game is even more fun. My 3 year old opened the boxed and instantly figured out what to do, without my having to explain anything. She popped out the circles and started filling out patterns (she was matching colors) and insisted I join her. We've started

experimenting with different pattern combinations, which is definitely more of a challenge--but I love that it's a game she can grow with. I think working with pattern recognition and logic will be a great preparation for math. I think this would be a hit with young homeschoolers (they can do it on their own while Mom or Dad work with older siblings) or any preK-early elementary classroom.

Great game based on a great book. My 3 year old loves board games and this is one of his own - instead of losing pieces from Mommy and Daddy's. Beyond that the game makes you think and engenders conversation - both great things.

My 7 year old son and I have enjoyed playing this game together as a duo, and with grandma, and with guests. Easy enough for kids to play without adult intervention - he was easily able to rustle up a game with neighbor kids and explain the concept to them. The most spirited round we have played was with the two of us, my friend and her 9 year old daughter. We laughed and strategized color patterns and debated. A big win for visual, color-lovin' folks of all ages.

We gave this game to our 3- year old granddaughter for her birthday. She loved playing it with her (almost) 7- year old brother and us all afternoon, and didn't get tired of it. Neither did we! I love the fact that it truly is for any age. She beat the rest of us a few times, much to her brother's chagrin. It's compact and doesn't require any batteries. All you need is a table or a floor, and you're good to go.

I bought this game for my 4 year old son for Christmas. It does say ages 3+, and from the description it sounded like it would be fun and easy to play with my son. We had already read the book many times and he loved it! He's pretty intelligent for his age and a good problem solver, but I think even the easiest level is too advanced for him right now. In order to be able to play the game you have to understand the concept, which is to follow and continue the patterns. It sounds easier than it really is. He didn't quite grasp the game concept and got easily frustrated, even with the adults trying to help. However, there are still ways to play with the game pieces (cards with dot patterns, and punched out cardboard dots) without following the rules of the game, so it's still a fun "toy" for him. We will probably try the game again when he's closer to 5 and see if it's easier for him then.

Gave it as a gift to my 4 yr old niece and the feedback from her mom is that the game is really fun and the first game where my niece will sit and follow the rules. I interpret this to mean that the game

is very engaging for little ones and the parents also have a good time. She went out of her way to tell me how great the game was.

My girls love this game and I love hearing their reasoning when we play. Lots of fun and easy to adapt for younger kiddos. I think they would play for hours if I let them. An adult needs to be part of the game though when playing with younger ones. Very fun!

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
